

## **Utah Section Update**

The ASCE Utah Section consists of four branches: Northern Utah, Wasatch Front, Central Utah, and Southern Utah. The Section mainly works in an administrative capacity and most of our activities are done on the Branch level with the exception of the Annual Utah Section meeting, which is held in May or June of each year. The 2019 Annual Section Meeting will be held in Utah County, the heart of our Central Utah Branch.

The 2018 Utah Section Meeting was held in June of this year at Utah State University in Logan, and was attended by ASCE President-Elect Robyn Kemper. We started our meeting with a brunch with Robyn and the Section, Branch, YMF and Institute leaders to have a Q&A session with Robyn. Following the brunch, we welcomed the members from all over the Utah Section and began our meeting. Robyn was the keynote speaker and led a great discussion on how ASCE benefits our industry. Following her comments, the Section awarded Guna Gunalan with the Utah Section Engineer of the Year Award, and then swore in the new officers. The meeting wrapped up with a tour of the Utah State University Water lab to watch the Oroville Dam model in action. It was interesting to watch. We want to give a special thanks to Dr. Michael Johnson for giving us the tour. The Northern Utah Branch continues to provide value to our members in the Cache Valley. They plan and conduct a monthly member's luncheon with technical speakers on a variety of topics. Their most recent presentation was on the Flint Michigan water crisis. The branch also continues to support the Utah State University Student Chapter and recently met with the Senior Design class to discuss the value of membership in ASCE to their careers.

The Wasatch Front Branch has an active Community Giving Committee that plans service projects throughout the year. They are currently planning a fundraiser for a local Sub for Santa program, and an activity at a local school during Engineer's Week in February. The Wasatch Front Branch also holds monthly luncheons for their members with speakers presenting on a variety of topics. They recently heard from the Utah Department of Transportation's Freight Manager on the logistics of moving freight through Utah.

There are exciting things happening in the Central Utah Branch. Utah Valley University (UVU) has added an ABET accredited Civil Engineering Program, and the branch is helping the University begin an ASCE Student Chapter. The Central Utah Branch is also actively seeking new Practitioner Advisors for UVU and BYU to strengthen these student chapters. The Central Utah Branch continues to sponsor a monthly luncheon and speakers for their members. The most recent speakers were from the Central Utah Water Conservancy District and spoke about their asset management program. The Southern Utah Branch has been teaming up with APWA and UCLS to sponsor monthly meetings. ASCE membership numbers are lower in the Southern Utah Branch, and by combining efforts with APWA and UCLS, they are able to increase attendance to the meetings. This has been a very successful partnership. The speaker from the most recent luncheon was Utah Congressman Christ Stewart, who discussed the Federal status of the Lake Powell Pipeline and the Northern Corridor. The luncheon was very well attended.

The Utah Section Younger Member Forum has been working closely with the university student chapters. They are planning a volleyball social with the BYU student chapter, and are co-hosting a resume workshop with the University of Utah student chapter in November. The Utah Section YMF brings a lot of value to our Section.

As you can see, Utah is a great place to be an ASCE member. Not only do we have the greatest snow on earth, but some of the greatest engineers as well. If you ever find yourself in Utah, you are invited to come to one of our branch meetings and meet our wonderful members.
