Describe outreach activities with elementary, middle, or high schools (1 point each, 5 points max):	The STEM committee organized a STEM outreach activity at CECON. 46 high school students from Frisco ISD visited CECON and participated in a 3-hour long session. To start, STEM committee members did an overview presentation of civil engineering. Four of ASCE's institutes, GI, T&DI, CI and EWRI, set up tables with interactive activities teaching the students about their respective civil engineering subdisciplines. Also, TAME participated with an interactive table, having students solve an engineering problem and design a sustainable solution. All the students were very engaged and asked many questions. To close the session, a Boston Dynamics SPOT robot dog was presented, and the

	students learned about the various certifications students can obtain. Overall, the event was a major success and something scalable for the future.

The student activities committee hosts a monthly meeting with section leaders, student leaders, and advisors to discuss a beneficial topic. At the Student Symposium, professionals are invited to social networking with the students. The Student Activities Committee hosted a competition to rename the regional symposium, which over 50 Texas Section student members participated in. The Texas Section Student Activities Committee met virtually with the Angelo State University ASCE Student

Chapter to plan the Region 6 Student Symposium held April 2024.

- The Texas Section Student Activities Committee began planning and coordination meeting with the Student Chapter at Tarleton State University for the 2025 Region 6 Student Symposium.
- Aside from regular email/social media communication, the main interaction between the Section and student members is the annual Student Symposium. This event has been growing larger over the years and morphed into a Region 6 event starting in 2022. In total, 630 students from 30 schools attended the 2024 Region 6 Student Symposium and they had the opportunity to interact with over 125 professionals ranging from sponsor attendees to speakers to judges.

Student Symposium planners and local chapter students attended the summer Leadership Development Weekend. Student members are encouraged to attend CECON each year and provided with a discounted rate. More than 28 students attended the 2024 CECON in Frisco, from schools across the country (UTA, Texas A&M Corpus Christi, SMU, Prairie View A&M, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, UT Tyler HEC, MIT, and University of Houston.)




