


Welcome to Colorado



2025 Infrastructure Report Card Release and Legislative Fly In

Being the year after the presidential election, ASCE released our latest Infrastructure Report Card this spring in Washington DC at the Solutions Summit. This was scheduled ahead of this year's Legislative Fly In, which had the luck to fall during the DC Cherry Blossom's peak bloom. I had the opportunity to witness the report card release and am excited to see the grade climb from a C- to a C. While this isn't a grade any of our college students would write home about, it is a testament to the financial and political support of infrastructure projects. With the increase of natural disasters and aging infrastructure, our attention to sustainable projects that will withstand stronger storms and solve the problems of today was my key takeaway. Our legislators appreciate knowing how the dollars they are securing for local infrastructure projects are impacting their state, and where there may be gaps that can use investment or attention.

ASCE Elections May 1- May 31, 2025

Voting opens for President-Elect, your next Director, and a few Governor rolls. Polls will also include a ballot item for Member Grade Consolidation. ASCE's 2023-2028 strategic plan sets forth a new vision for civil engineering. It renews our commitment to inspire, connect, and serve our global membership to maximize their professional and personal growth and magnify their lifelong professional impact. Accomplishing this mission also requires effectively managing our resources to provide exceptional value to our members. The strategic plan outlines actions that will significantly impact these goals, including improving pathways toward a more diverse, inclusive, and equitable profession, attracting new members from the broader infrastructure community, and cultivating a global, cross-disciplinary community of infrastructure professionals.

Reasons for member grade consolidation:

With this in mind, the ASCE Board of Direction believes that simplifying our member grade structure is one step toward accomplishing this mission. It would reduce costly business complexity, make it easier for prospective members to join, and make the organization more welcoming to members of the civil engineering team and those allied with the profession. This will lead to enhanced member value and better programs for our members.

Distinctions in member grades can cause unnecessary confusion. Currently, all Member, Associate, and Affiliate grades pay the same dues and have the same benefits and voting rights. Professional engineers use their P.E. credentials to designate their licensure status.

The board approved the amendments to the Society's Constitution (Article 2) on the first and second reading to streamline member grades into one member grade. The amendment now goes before members for their vote in this May's election.




